- Mark your calendars: The Annual ESS/ARD Meeting originally scheduled to be face-to-face in Baltimore will instead be held virtually. Reminders/Updates:

• We're interested to hear how you and your institution is responding to the U.S. Immigrations and Customs Enforcement (ICE) guidance on modifications to temporary exemptions for nonimmigrant students. As the Chronicle for Higher Education noted on July 6, ICE has announced that international students whose colleges are offering courses exclusively online as a consequence of the pandemic will not be issued student visas or otherwise be allowed to enter or remain in the United States. The Dean of the Graduate School at the University of Rhode Island has shared some strategies for addressing this including using hybrid courses, assigning meeting times and rooms for graduate research and special

problems, and using existing seminar courses to create 1-credit classes that could be taught face-to-face. How are you dealing with the issue? Please share strategies with Rick. As a post script to this, legal action was jointly filed today by attorneys general for Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Illinois, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Nevada, New Jersey, New Mexico, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, Virginia, Wisconsin, plus the District of Columbia (9 of which are in the Northeast.)

- Mike Hoffman, former AES director from Cornell, will be delivering the eCornell keynote titled <u>Our Changing Menus: Climate Change and the Foods We Love and Need</u> on Wednesday, July 15 at 1:00PM EDT. Registration is required.
- Now that the 2021 NERA budget has passed, we sent out assessment notices electronically. You might want to give your business offices a heads-up.
